A Note from the Pastor

Happy Saint Patrick's Day to all with real or wished-for ties to the "holy land!" This day often falls in Lent, and the Lenten weekday liturgy takes precedence over the saint's memorial. When newly ordained, I was assigned to Boston for several years. Given that, even now, there's something terminally Irish about Boston Catholicism, I took the liberty of vesting in green, much to the irritation of some older friars and much to the delight of the congregation. But Sundays in Lent trump all other feasts. With that and a few decades of common sense under my belt, it'll be purple this weekend (sigh).

All immigrant groups - the Germans excepted - came to the US in miserable condition. But more so, the Irish. They came in droves, "pushed" by famine, poverty, and persecution, and "pulled" by dreams of anything better. Early histories of their ghettoes in Boston and New York are chilling reminders of why they were feared and scorned: poor and disease-ridden, and prone to crime, they became a burden on what social services existed. Their Catholicism made them politically suspect. But, in time, they discovered a weapon - made more deadly by their numbers - that helped them turn things around: political clout. It would take longer for social and economic success, but control of city hall was a door-opener.

The still-strong and pervasive Irishness still celebrated in many east coast cities is a way of celebrating the eventual success of a destitute and despised people in becoming "mainstream." Today's parades and green beer are elements of nostalgia for a past none of today's Irish-Americans wants to recapture. And yet, it reminds us of the power "roots" exert. Had Ireland's history been different, it's likely many of us who wear the green today wouldn't be here. There's something about "home."

The history of the Irish in America, with a variation here and there, is the history of most immigrant groups. It's a story about a "push" and a "pull." And while the "push" has always been strong, it's been the even stronger "pull" that gave people the courage to chance the perils of the North Atlantic, and today, the Sonoran desert.

Today, we face what 19th and early 20th century Americans faced. We fear the diminishments to our way of life posed by strange and possibly subversive newcomers. And yet, unlike the Yankees before us, we've got hard evidence that the challenges of assimilating dreaded newcomers is worth the struggle.

While the welcome chiseled onto the Statue of Liberty reflects us at our best, we know how hard it's been - and is - to be our best. Yet, here you and I are. And few of us would claim that we've been a drag on what our forebears found. We're living proof that the "pull" that brought our families here was worth the risk.

In the midst of our current border challenges, we might find a way of meeting those challenges by remembering who we were and what we've become. And be grateful that others still find the "pull" worth the risk. It's not so much a threat as a benediction. Fr. Dan

During Lent, we are singing the penitential rite using the Greek words "Kyrie eleison." We again use the phrase as the response to the General Intercessions. According to the book *Orthodox Worship*, "The word mercy in English is the translation of the Greek word eleos. This word has the same ultimate root as the old Greek word for oil, or more precisely, olive oil; a substance which was used extensively as a soothing agent for bruises and minor wounds. The oil was poured onto the wound and gently massaged in, thus soothing, comforting and making whole the injured part. The Hebrew word which is also translated as eleos and mercy is hesed, and means steadfast love. The Greek words for 'Lord, have mercy,' are 'Kyrie, eleison' that is to say, 'Lord, soothe me, comfort me, take away my pain, show me your steadfast love.' "

Instead of standing in front of a tribunal at the beginning of Mass asking for mercy from a powerful judge, we are face-to-face with a compassionate God, who is ready to pick us up when we fall down.
