A Note from the Pastor

The origins of Memorial Day are complicated and convoluted. But despite the various assertions as to the holiday's when, where, and how, the common thread through it all is the felt need of a grateful people to honor sacrifice. Which always remains food for thought.



"Sacrifice" comes from the Latin and means "to make sacred." Offering sacrifice "makes sacred" what is offered and why it is offered. I don't think it's ever been lost on us that the lives given in service were and remain sacred. It's the why that seems to escape us.

National service is no longer compulsory. Many will argue that this is a good move, entrusting the national defense to those willing to be formed by the disciplines needed to succeed in battle. And it saves us from the spectacle seen in the call to arms for the Civil War (on both sides) and World War I when going off to battle was filled with good cheer and the expectation that the troops would be home in short order. A volunteer army is an army of the properly trained and those sober about the "hell" of war.

But getting into war – as we have seen and are seeing – in recent history is a slippery slope. We'd like to think that thoughtful presidents and right-thinking advisors, together with the Constitution's insistence that Congress make the call before foreign policy involves the lives of our sons and daughters, would make war a last resort. But they don't.

In my judgement, it's a citizen's army whose actions the whole nation's – and not a small portion thereof – moms and dads would carefully watch that is the best safeguard. The power of public opinion based on parental love for the nation's children is the best assurance that our military doesn't become a tool for political purposes.

More importantly, unless one has skin in the game, the game can easily become a take it or leave it affair. Having lived through Viet Nam, when the army was populated by a draft, and the debacle of Iraq, I noticed the attention given to these wars on the evening news. During Viet Nam, Walter Cronkite kept families posted as to how many of their neighborhood's youth had died that day. In time, the American people let their politicians know that they'd had enough. As the war in Iraq turned into a quagmire, nothing of the sort happened. Too few had skin in the game.

As people of the Gospel, we know a thing or two about sacrifice for the common good. On this Memorial Day, perhaps we can tune out the commercials for new cars and remind ourselves of how grateful we are for the sacrifices made because those who sacrificed also knew a thing or two about the common good. And reinvigorate our dedication to being a people worthy of the lives we memorialize. A worthiness that refuses to shy away from having some skin in the game.

Come Down, O Love Divine

Our offertory hymn on Ascension Sunday (June 2) will reference the first reading and the Gospel, anticipating the gift of the Holy Spirit. Though the third person of the Trinity is not specifically named until the very last line of the hymn, it is clear through the terms "O Love divine" and "O Comforter" that the Holy Spirit is the one to whom this prayer is addressed.

Bianco da Siena, who composed the hymn text, was an Italian monk who wrote poems called *laudi spirituali* in the fourteenth century. Ralph Vaughan Williams wrote the tune *Down Ampney* for this text in the English Hymnal in 1906. It was named after his birthplace and has been praised as one of the most beautiful hymn tunes ever written.

Whether you prefer to listen to a new hymn or like to "give it a go" and sing the new melody after hearing the first stanza, it is always helpful to look up the hymn and follow the words as they are sung. Hymns are chosen to fit in with the readings, as well as the liturgical moment and the season, so our hymnals are a wonderful resource for meditative reading both prior to worship and during the singing itself.
