#### A Note From the Pastor

From grade school though grad school, one of the best classes I ever had was Mrs. Corbett's 8th grade social studies. The last class each week was devoted to current events and presented by one of us students. Not only did we have to sketch out the facts (including where we got them), we had to offer some analysis, answering the "so what" question. Why did this issue or event merit our attention? And most importantly, what did we think? What was memorable were the many post-class discussions and arguments. Looking back, we kids were being reminded that, even as 13 yr olds, life was big, and we had skin in the game.

How times have changed.

A few years ago during the contentious confirmation process of Supreme Court Justice Kavanaugh, one of our grad students was asked what he thought of it all. He didn't even know it was taking place. He wasn't alone.

More recently, the day *Roe v. Wade* was overturned I asked some a small group of our college women what they and their friends were saying. They said, except for a text or two, no one was saying much.

In the past, I've suggested that one of the keys to Jesus' success was his familiarity with the world around him. The carpenter's son from a town that one of his disciples thought no good could come, was keenly aware of the society in which he lived, the politics that shaped his religion (the Pharisees' agenda was shaped by resistance to Roman imperialism), and the culture that produced the many marginalized whom he paid special attention to.

His message of redemption was laser focused on sin, not simply as an occasion of human weakness, but as a "way," a point of view, that corroded his Father's dream for creation. Jesus was controversial because his preaching was aimed at making a difference in how people actually came at life. He couldn't be ignored. You either loved or hated what he said. Because his success or failure was going to make a difference in what you did when you got out of bed each day.

How times have changed.

There's a great line in the Book of Wisdom that has been used to name what it is to be a saint. "Friends of God and prophets." John's Gospel reminds us that Jesus wanted our relationship with him to one of friendship. And yet who of us is accustomed to thinking of holiness as friendship? I suspect few because we tend to think that God is so "other," and our friends, "not so other." Yet, Jesus says that this thinking is wrong-headed. If we do what he commands. Which is quite straightforward. Love one another as I have loved you. Not episodically, but as a way of going at life. As a measure of whether laws and policies as well as individual encounters are noble or not.

Which brings us back to the top of this page. Fr. Dan
