

A Note From the Pastor

"Epiphany" is a word we probably never use except for this encounter between the Magi and Jesus. It's a Greek word that means "manifestation," usually of a divine nature with the deity taking the initiative.

It's interesting that when used by the Greeks and Romans "epiphanies" were usually eyepopping in their majesty. But when used by Christians, it describes something underwhelming. The Magi witnessed an epiphany in which God appears in diapers. Probably fussing to be fed. Or sleeping through the whole encounter. I can only imagine what the astrologers told the folks back home!

We might wish they had hung around long enough to see this child give new life to a wedding-without-wine, to lepers – literally resurrected them from a death to family, friends, and public life - or to the life that sight, hearing, or mobility gives.

But even then, as far as the Gospels teach, these "signs" were just that - actions pointing to something beyond themselves, beyond the effects of medicine. And what about the Eucharist? Left without eating or drinking, the Eucharist rots and goes sour and, according to Catholic theology, ceases to be the Real Presence. It's what our Communion points to that makes the Real Presence credible.

All of which gives importance to what a lot of Catholics rate as secondary or lower among our moral principles - our Church's social teaching. Or, since it captures our attention more quickly than not, our social morality.

As we celebrate the Epiphany, we ought to remember that the "manifestation" of the one we call God - the Trinity of Father, Son, and Holy Spirit - is never self-centered but is always a show of God in some activity he wants us to take up and make part of our own lives

We've all seen the cartoon suggesting that Mary and Jospeh, while grateful for the gold, frankincense, and myrrh, would have preferred what Wise Women (vs. Wise Men) would have brought - a few casseroles, extra diapers, and lots of formula. And we laugh because it's so true.

And it's also so true that every "manifestation" of our God was a sign having to do with how we should live. Epiphanies are teaching moments for us. We merely skim the surface of our Bible reading unless we take the time to ask of a "sign" we read about, "What's this mean in my life? What does this event of Cana, the 10 lepers, and the graciousness of Jesus to the Syrophoenician woman teach us about what real Christian religion is about?"

"Morality" is a way of living built of "morals," or "customs." Our Catholic morality comes from the "customs" found in the actions that manifest in our lives the values Jesus manifested in his as ways of living the humanity God had in mind in the beginning - the God-given (vs. the legal given) dignity of each person; work and those who do it; a place at the table of creation's goods and resources and the table of participation in law and policy making ... and so on.

May the Epiphany be more than a remembrance of three wise men. May it be the experience family, neighbors, and co-workers experience from us each day of this new year – and beyond.
