A Note From the Pastor

Each Gospel tells the story of Jesus focusing on his ministry. Yet, with a day to ourselves and some determination, we could read all four Gospels in a day's sitting. Which means each Gospel leaves out a whole lot of the mundane in Jesus' life – the downtime with his apostles, the chatter with folks he met along the streets of each town as he meandered around the places he visited before or after he'd formally taught.

What was it like to meet him in these serendipitous encounters, not unlike our own as we navigate through each day chatting up our miscellaneous encounters with merchants, neighbors, and "around the water cooler?"

This weird thought came to me as I read a line in Paul's Letter to the Galatians where he writes, You are my children, and you put me back in labor pains until Christ is formed in you. Until Christ is formed in you. Forming Christ in others was Paul's mission. What was the evidence that measured his success – or not?

Most of us have been disciples (aka, *"students"*) of the gospel for a long time. Students are always trying to sift their learning for what they believe to be the essence of the course. What have we sifted out from our encounters with the gospel? Dos and don'ts? What we call "doctrine?"

And yet, while suspecting Paul had those in mind, when he writes to the Galatians, he's seeking different evidence as marks of his success – that his converts be folks who, when met and chatted up by others, leave those others with the same experience those who chatted up Jesus had. A reminder that, important as catechetics might be, more important is what our dispositions learn.

As we head into Lent with hopefully a goal in mind, we might consider giving Paul the satisfaction he hoped to have with the Galatians – that Christ is formed in us.

If Christ were formed in us, we'd almost surely be known as folks who are attentive, patient, understanding, sympathetic, just, compassionate, and enormously forgiving. Folks who were obviously interested in the people we encounter. And then, what would our countless experiences of others – as Christ had such experiences – do in shaping the way we encounter the big issues of the day? Remembering that the big issues – injustice, poverty, discrimination, truth-telling – are not abstract. They have names and faces.

As a teacher, Jesus' subject matter was himself – his own mind and heart. To disciples who'd been raised on the nit-picking of the scribes and Pharisees and Temple priests, Jesus taught a way of sharing life with others. He warned his disciples to do what the scribes taught them, but not to live like them.

Bottom line, Lent is best experienced as a season of the heart and not the mind. Which is why Lent can be tough. It's easier to digest our catechism than it is to fine-tune our hearts to the Eucharist. But Scripture tells us, "... faith, hope, and love abide, these three; but the greatest of these is love."

During Lent, we observe the penitential nature of the season through increased prayer, fasting, and almsgiving. Liturgical music becomes simpler and sparer: the Gloria and Alleluia are omitted; preludes are chant-based or silent; we leave Mass singing Adoramus Te, Christe (We adore you, Christ), and there are no organ postludes. Meditation and quiet prayer are the norm. The piano and organ are less active, allowing the voice of the assembly to dominate our chants, hymns, and responses.
